- Trowel or scoop: A small plastic scoop or gutter tool makes it easier to get rid of trash.
- Use a bucket or tarp to pick up trash instead of dropping it on your landscaping.
- A garden hose with a spray nozzle: After you clean up the trash, flush your gutters and downspouts to make sure the water flows correctly.
- Safety goggles: Keep dirt and falling objects out of your eyes.

Telescoping gutter cleaning tools or a leaf blower attachment made for gutters are optional but useful.

How to Clean Your Gutters in Steps

1. Make sure your ladder is safe

Put it on flat ground, use stabilizers, and have someone watch you if you can. Always put safety first.

2. Take out the trash

Begin at one end and move across. With your scoop or gloved hands, get rid of leaves, twigs, and debris.

3. Look for clogs

Take a good look at the downspouts. The most common reason for gutters to overflow is clogs.

4. Flush with water

Use a hose to clean out the gutters and see how well the water flows. Look for leaks or parts that are sagging and may need to be fixed.

5. Check out your system

Check for rust, cracks, or parts that are pulling away from the house. Finding small problems early can save you from having to do big repairs later.

6. Take care of cleaning up

If you can, put trash in yard waste bags or compost.

- Don't ever climb on the roof; it's dangerous and slippery.

• Forgetting to do maintenance: You should fix loose fasteners, rust, and sagging parts right away.
